The Wardcliff Grove

Many members of the Wardcliff School neighborhood have been energized by the idea of planting a fruit orchard near the community garden. This grove would serve to rekindle a "sense of community" in the area amongst diverse citizens in the neighborhood – children, retirees, children with autism who use the Wardcliff building, alumni and retired teachers of Wardcliff Elementary, and possibly area businesses.

The Wardcliff Neighborhood Association and various individuals from Okemos, Haslett, and East Lansing support the idea. A pilot project has been started with five trees, a weeping cherry, two chestnuts and two paw paw trees, that over time would yield fruit to share with the neighborhood and the MSU Food Pantry. A few more trees and berry bushes will be planted in the fall. The weeping cherry tree is dedicated to Laurel Hanson from our neighborhood who passed away last year.



We envision the Wardcliff Grove to be a place for annual alumni gatherings, a nexus for graduates, teachers, and parents with



fond memories of this place. Thus, we hope the idea of the Grove will be the foundation to renew a sense of community in our neighborhood.

Seed money came from funds donated by colleagues at MSU for Esther Onaga's retirement. The Hansen family purchased the weeping cherry tree. Several individuals have offered to donate funds to the project. Additional funds are needed to cultivate the plantings, install deer deterrents, soil maintenance, pruning, and provision for replacement trees in case some do not survive.

WNA Hosts Primary Election Candidate Forum

The Wardcliff Neighborhood Association (WNA) was pleased to host a Candidate Forum at the Wardcliff School on July 26, 2016. Twelve candidates running for positions on the Meridian Township Board were invited to participate in the Forum to introduce themselves to the Wardcliff community and answer questions from the audience.

Participating candidates for Supervisor were Milton Scales, Ron Styka, and Tom Klunzinger. They were joined by two candidates for Clerk, Brett Dreyfus and Gayelord Mankowski. Treasurer Julie Brixie also attended, as well as six candidates for Trustee: John Veenstra, Brian Czubak, Brett DeGroff, Dan Opsommer, Patricia Jackson, and Phil Deschaine.



Among the issues discussed were CATA's proposed Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) system, and problems resulting from high traffic density along the Grand River Corridor between Hagadorn and Park Lake Roads.

All the candidates agreed to work with Wardcliff residents, the Okemos School Board, and the township to re-activate the Wardcliff Elementary School. Other topics of concern were the use of Brownfield credits to support high density mixed use developments in the township, as well as the need for enhanced code enforcement in the Wardcliff neighborhood.

Following the question and answer session, the candidates and attendees had a chance to mingle and discuss issues of interest that impact our township and our neighborhood. It was an enjoyable event, and the WNA board is grateful to the candidates and residents who came out on a pleasant summer evening to take part in the process of selecting the future leaders of township government.

CATA's Assistant Executive Director Deb Alexander used a slide presentation to explain what the BRT is and how it will change traffic flow on Grand River Avenue, including the way we would be able to access our homes and local businesses.


