BWL Solar Project in East Lansing Park

The first Lansing Board of Water and Light solar park is being built on the retired landfill site at Burcham Park, at the corner of Park Lake and Burcham.

Built by Patriot Solar Group of Albion, the park will have 1,800 solar panels.

Each panel is rated at 300 watts. Annual electricity production from the array will be about 385,000 kilowatt-hours which is enough energy to power 55 average house-holds for a year.

Leasing of the panels will allow BWL electric customers to obtain solar power energy without having to install panels on their homes or businesses.



Participants will need to sign a 25-year lease and pay an upfront cost of \$399 per solar panel. They may also lease more than one panel.

Construction will begin in East Lansing once 80 percent of the panels have been leased. Credits will be issued to individuals' electricity bills. The panels are expected to pay for themselves in 10-16 years, according to an article by the Lansing State Journal.

At the Township Board Meeting held on August 1, 2017, Christine Beavers was nominated by Supervisor Ron Styka and approved unanimously by the Township Board to become a member of the Meridian Township Transportation Commission.

The seven-member commission meets monthly to consider a wide range of transportation-related issues including improvements in the Redi-Ride service and other forms of public transportation, updates in the pedestrian/bicycle pathway system, the need for audible traffic signals, and the possible creation of Quiet Zones for railway crossings, just to name a few.

First Rabies Case in 2017

The first case of rabies this year in Michigan has been confirmed in Ingham County in May.

Authorities say a brown bat tested positive for the disease, which can be fatal to humans.

Rabies can be transmitted through a bite or scratch from an infected animal. Bats and skunks are the most common carriers. There were 41 cases reported in 2016.

State authorities claim that pets and domestic livestock should be vaccinated for rabies. If your animal is bitten, contact your veterinarian as soon as possible. If you are bitten or scratched by an animal, seek immediate medical attention.

West Nile Virus Confirmed in Michigan

In May, officials from the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services confirmed that the West Nile virus was identified in a **turkey** in Barry County, a **crow** in Kalamazoo County, and a **crow** in Saginaw County. Warnings have been issued to try and prevent mosquito bites which can transmit the virus.

Symptoms of West Nile virus include fever, confusion, muscle weakness, and severe headache. More serious complications include neurological illnesses, such as meningitis and encephalitis.

Last year, the state says there were 43 serious illnesses and three deaths related to West Nile virus in Michigan.
